Hamilton and Waterloo airports are located outside of the GTA, the Oshawa airport has no room to expand, and Toronto Pearson has reached its economic capacity. Pearson's numbers have increased from 30 million passengers in 2009 to 47 million

passengers in 2017. The businesses in the Pearson Economic Zone can't expand to suit their growing needs, including getting airside access and industrial space on airport lands. We have a unique opportunity to unlock the economic potential of the east GTA: the airport lands in Pickering.

Why Pickering?

The Federal Government chose Pickering as the location for a future airport almost 50 years ago. No other metropolitan area the size of the GTA has this much land set aside for a secondary airport near existing infrastructure, including 400-series highways, railways, ports, and designated employment lands. It's time for the federal government to make a decision. It's time to seize this opportunity before us.

An unprecedented opportunity

On April 9, the Toronto Region Board of Trade co-hosted an event with the City of Pickering where two of North America's top urban and economic experts discussed the economic potential of a Toronto East Aerotropolis.

Kasarda, American academic, aviation consultant, and author of Aerotropolis: The Way We'll Live Next, highlighted the potential of an economic development zone anchored by a new airport in Pickering. Pickering Recreation Complex renovations

After 35 years, the main public spaces of the Pickering Recreation Complex are showing their age. The City hired Barry Bryan & Associates to conduct architectural and engineering design services for main floor renovations of the existing main concourse, service counters, related security and accessibility upgrades, change rooms, and the exterior of the main entrance.

Extensive community engagement was done with the public, Recreation Complex members and guests to shape the design of the new lobby entrance and change facilities.

Construction is expected to begin in December 2019, subject to Council approval, and take approximately 12-14 months to complete.

The City has sought public input on two significant community issues – retail cannabis sales and alcohol consumption in Pickering's public spaces.

The Province gave municipalities a January 22, 2019 deadline to either opt in or out of allowing cannabis retail stores within their boundaries. The City chose to opt out, knowing that it could potentially opt in later after it completes its community consultations and undertakes a broad based review of the issue.
